Contest Champion



Tim Van de Molen of the Waikato/Bay of Plenty Region is the 2013 ANZ Young Farmer Contest Champion.

"I'm just delighted with the outcome", said Mr Van de Molen. "It's an honour and a privilege", he continued.

Mr Van de Molen is an ANZ agri-manager and farm owner from Hamilton. "I've wanted to achieve this for a long time... preparation has been in process for a number of years", commented Mr Van de Molen, who was also runner up in the 2011 Grand Final.

"I was extremely nervous", he said, even if he was, you couldn't tell from looking at him. Mr Van de Molen

certainly shone during the speeches and question round evening show.

"I enjoyed the Contest overall, the practical side was very challenging with the conditions" Mr Van de Molen commented, as there was torrential downpour during the practical day events at Kumeu Showgrounds in Auckland.

The thirty year old has proven himself to be a well-rounded and driven

individual and he sees this accomplishment as a stepping stone into a broader role in the rural sector and he commented that his preparation for the Contest relied upon the wider agricultural industry: "It's about getting out and getting involved in the industry and using those opportunities and connections to build your network and build your knowledge base", he said.

Mr Van de Molen also took the time to commend the other Contestants, "they certainly pushed it to the wire, it was a close full battle", he said.

He took home nearly \$70,000 in prizes including \$10,000 cash from ANZ, entrance to Kellogg's Rural Programme from Lincoln University valued at \$5,000, Ravensdown and C-Dax products worth \$7,000, an AGMARDT scholarship towards a career development programme worth \$2,000, a gourmet BBQ and farm technology package

from Silver Fern Farms and FarmIQ worth \$10,000, a Honda TRX500FRM ATV and EU20 Inverter generator worth \$19,700, Husqvarna power equipment worth \$8,000 and \$7,000 of Vodafone products and services. He also took out the Lincoln University Agri-growth Challenge and received \$9,500 towards an industry related conference package.

Mr Van de Molen offered some sound advice for all Young Farmers: "Get involved and give it a go, it's a fantastic competition you learn so much and grow so much from it".

As for the future, Mr Van de Molen has plans for an overseas trip to Europe and the UK, and, of course to relax and get back into the swing of normal life; however, he won't be resting for long..."It's not the end, just the beginning. I'm passionate about agriculture and I hope this will be a springboard to continue that involvement longterm".























Auckland City Councillor George Wood opened the proceedings and was delighted this leading agricultural event has come to the 'City of Sails'.

"We townies look in awe as these young farmers from all over the country get into these different challenges and do such a great job", Councillor Wood said.

The seven Grand Finalists rode into the square on Honda farm bikes and were introduced to the public by Contest announcer Craig 'Wiggy' Wiggins and Contest Chairman Bevan Proffit.

"It takes a lot of passion and a lot of determination, you also have to be a good all-rounder", commented Mr Proffit on what it takes to be the Contest Champion.

After the introductions it was straight into the first Head-to-Head Challenge where a delicate touch was required to chainsaw a sculpture of the Skytower out of a wooden post in just ten minutes

AGMARDT Business Breakfast

Jeff Grant, Chairman of AGMARDT, hosted the annual AGMARDT Business Breakfast. This year the event was held at Soljans Winery in Kumeu and there were three guest speakers to discuss the media within agriculture.

Vincent Heeringa, Director at Tangible Media, Publisher at Idealog and an established figure in the media industry, spoke about

innovation and disruption, good and bad, across all industries, including agriculture.

Mr Heeringa highlighted that disruption happens to all industries and it's "not about being the smartest, fastest, or the biggest, it's about adapting to change, and that requires teamwork, intelligence, and openness to change".

Country TV News Producer, Drew Chappell presented on

Mr Chappell also underscored that for the media to be a good, useful tool for the rural sector, stories, events and information need to be framed within an issue and put it into context for the audience

Former Young Farmer member and seasoned rural journalist, Alan Emerson also spoke to the crowd. He explained that the media is driven by numbers, ratings and budgets, and it's purpose it is more or less entertainment.

He used Young Farmers as an example and highlighted that Clubs can have their events covered quite easily in the media, and that "the 4th estate is not that hard to approach".

Practical Day

The beautiful Kumeu Showgrounds played host to the Practical Day of the ANZ Young Farmer Contest for the 2013 Grand Final, it was a great day, even if the weather did not cooperate.

RAVENSDOWN AGRI-SKILLS CHALLENGE

The Agri-skills Challenge is designed to test the breadth of knowledge of the competitors and this year included farmlets.

Within their farmlet the Contestants were required to erect the perimeter fence, construct a picnic table, build a pen to contain their sheep, connect up a water trough, complete some riparian planting and put together a beehive.

Contestants also went 'off farm' for several tasks such as digger skills, first aid, engineering and cooking.

LINCOLN UNIVERSITY AGRI-GROWTH CHALLENGE

The Agri-growth Challenge delves into character of the Contestant and assesses their people management skills. The Contestants faced an interview panel of three, and also facilitated a family discussion on farm succession.

AGMARDT AGRI-GROWTH CHALLENGE

The Agri-growth Challenge requires Contestants to present a market innovation project that they had completed prior to Grand Final.

SILVER FERN FARMS AGRI-SPORTS CHALLENGES

As the rain really set in, the second of the Silver Fern Farms Head-to-Head Challenges got underway. Contestants were required to build a block stay and hang a gate.

The big crowd pleaser that is the Silver Fern Farms Agri-sports Challenge took place in the afternoon. The race course started with Contestants reeling in their catamaran they had built the day before at the Official Opening. Whilst enduring the downpour, the Contestants completed many tasks including chainsawing a cricket bat, plumbing in a pressurised waterline, attaching a spreader to the Honda quad and spreading Ravensdown lime, mowing the ANZ logo with a Honda mower, building a brick puzzle of the Silver Fern Farms logo, and lasso a makeshift cow. It wouldn't be a Northern event without Contestants putting their face in something slimy...The Contestants dove head first into a bowl of cream to retrieve jaffas - without using their hands.




The Grand Final of the ANZ Young Farmer Contest was televised on TV ONE with coverage the following day on TVNZ Heartland.
